An unusual work that generally covers all aspects of army training and administration for men called suddenly into active military service. Organization of all branches are included, with diagrams of formations and examples of administrative forms, Articles of War, and much more, (including 14p. of military music!). This manual, authored by a VMI instructor just before the Civil War began, was widely accepted in the South as the standard for the training of Confederate regiments, and was subsequently reprinted there. This copy belonged to C.P. Humsich of 1st PA Reserve (30th Inf.), and is dated on the front fly "Sept. 16 1862". The songs, arranged for four voices, include "Dying Volunteer," "Brave Boys They Are," by Henry C. Work (the most notable songsmith represented), "Contraband's Jubilee," and "Volunteer's Grave." A fascinating war time relic of life on the Chicago home front.
