Andreas, A.T. HISTORY OF CHICAGO. FROM THE EARLIEST PERIOD TO THE PRESENT TIME. Chicago: 1884. 1st ed., 3 vols. (648p.; 780p.; 876p.), plates, illus., maps, facsim. [Howes A-243] Important early history of the city, highly informative and copiously illustrated, by a noted local publisher. Volume II covers the Civil War years, which includes Camp Douglas, relief work in the city, and capsule histories of Chicago regiments, including the Ellsworth Zouaves, the Chicago Board of Trade Battery, and the 8th Illinois Cavalry. An excellent source on local as well as Civil War history. Cincinnati: 1834. 1st ed., wraps, 56p. [Howes D-463] Physician, educator, philanthropist, and civic leader, Drake of Cincinnati was also a prolific author, especially on the subject of medicine. Many of his writings were pamphlets on the local history of Ohio, and all are rare. Morse, Jedidiah. THE AMERICAN GAZETTEER...A MUCH MORE FULL AND ACCURATE ACCOUNT, THAN HAS BEEN GIVEN OF...THE AMERICAN CONTINENT. Boston: 1797. 1st ed., [619p.], ft. (fold. map), fold. maps. [Howes M-8391] The "father of American Geography", Morse was a clergyman, who, while teaching school, became dissatisfied with the English texts on America; in 1784 he prepared a series of lectures entitled *Geography Made Easy*, the first geography published in the United States. That book was such a success that Morse was soon producing other works, so much so that he soon practically monopolized geographies in this country. This is one of his most important titles, an encyclopedic compilation of the "States, Provinces, Counties, Cities, Towns, Villages, Rivers, Bays, Harbours, Gulfs, Sounds, Capes, Mountains, Forts, Indian Tribes" in North and South America, with latitudes and longitudes, information on governments, customs, manufacturing, commerce, the latest explorations in the Pacific, and much more. An amazing look at the New World, when it was even "newer". Sargent, Herbert H. THE CAMPAIGN OF SANTIAGO DE CUBA. Chicago: 1907. 1st ed., 3 vols. (274p.; 236p.; 268p.), fold. maps. A scarce analysis of the Cuban theatre in the Spanish-American War, by an outstanding military historian who commanded the 5th U.S. Infantry in the Campaign. Sifferath, Rev. N.L. A SHORT COMPENDIUM OF THE CATECHISM FOR THE INDIANS, WITH THE APPROBATION OF THE RT. REV. FREDERICK BARAGA, BISHOP OF SAULT SAINTE MARIE, 1864. Buffalo: 1869. Wraps, 62p. Sifferath, a Catholic missionary, followed up on the work of his predecessor Baraga, who had come to the U.S. from Austria in the 1830s as a missionary among the Ottawa and Ojibwa (or Otchipewe, or Chippewa) Indians of Michigan. Father Baraga mastered their language and published *Practical and Theoretical Grammar of the Otchipewe Language* and *Dictionary of the Otchipewe Language*, both in 1853, the year he became Bishop. This scarce pamphlet, aside from the title page, is almost completely in Ojibwa. In new facsimile blue wrappers with printed titles, w/ lt. wear but otherwise in v.g. condition; in a beautiful custom leather folder w/ protective wraps. \$650.00

Tumblety, Dr. Francis. A FEW PASSAGES IN THE LIFE OF, THE INDIAN HERB DOCTOR, INCLUDING HIS EXPERIENCE IN THE OLD CAPITOL PRISON....BY ORDER OF EDWIN STANTON, SECRETARY OF WAR.... Cincinnati: 1866. 1st.; 82p.; illustrated wrappers remarkably intact. Howes T413; not in Monaghan. Tumblety was an eccentric Herb Doctor arrested in Missouri for complicity in the Lincoln assassination. Although released, questions of his innocence remain. Recently, it has been speculated that the good doctor was Jack the Ripper (see the book *LODGER* by Paul Gainey). Excellent; chips at wrapper extrem. have been professionally filled-in. Most unusual and uncommon. \$495.00
