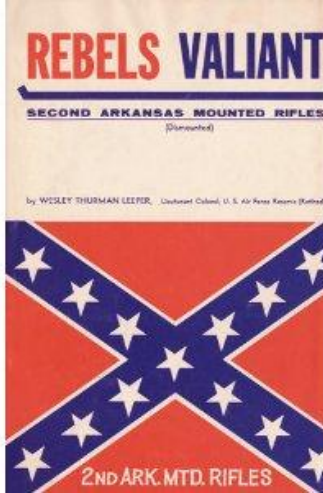

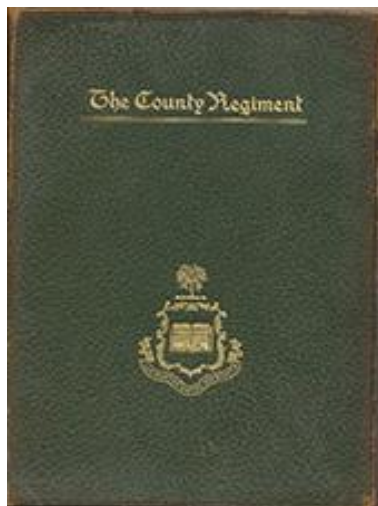

**Litchfield: (1908). 1<sup>st</sup> edition, 108p., portraits, all leather, top edge gilt, [D11].** This regiment of “heavies” joined the VI Corps during the Overland campaign, and became part of Emory Upton’s brigade. Served with distinction at Petersburg and in Sheridan’s Shenandoah Valley campaign. Lightly sunned; else very good. \$175.00

The 1<sup>st</sup> Delaware saw its first fight at the Bloody Lane at Antietam, and then served throughout the war in the II Corps. Rebound in archival paper with remnants of the original wrappers; much residue or tape previously used to repair it; otherwise clean with some pages uncut; in clamshell box. \$95.00

## Florida

(9<sup>th</sup> Florida) Loderhose, Gary. **FAR, FAR FROM HOME: THE NINTH FLORIDA REGIMENT IN THE CONFEDERATE ARMY.** **Carmel: (1999). 1<sup>st</sup> edition, 126p., illustrations, maps.** W.A. and Young Hunter were a conscripted father and son, and their letters form the backbone of this new history of these Florida Rebels. The Ninth initially patrolled the Florida coast for the Confederacy, fought at Olustee, then were transferred north to man the trenches of Petersburg, where they saw action from Cold Harbor to Appomattox. There are not very many regimental histories of Florida units; this is a welcome new addition. As new; dust jacket. \$22.95

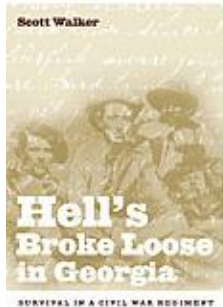
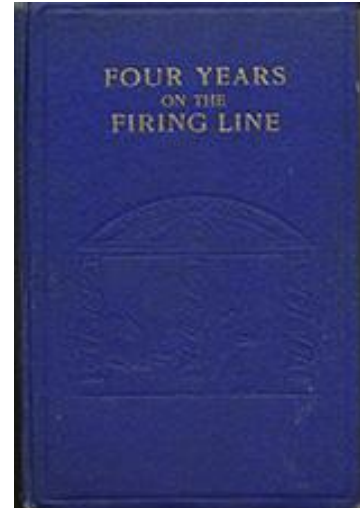

A modern regimental of a unit that fought under Lee at Gaines Mill, Second Manassas, Fredericksburg, Gettysburg, and elsewhere. As new; dust jacket. Signed. \$37.95

(21<sup>st</sup> Georgia) Nisbet, James C. **FOUR YEARS ON THE FIRING LINE...** Chattanooga: 1914. 1<sup>st</sup> edition, 445p, frontispiece, [D278, Howes N- 159, ITC #133, Eicher #296].

Nisbet was a Georgia farmer who rose to command a regiment. His excellent and very personal memoirs cover action in major battles in both theaters. Since he campaigned under General Lee as well as in the Atlanta Campaign, his accounts serve as a common resource for all modern literature on such battles as Antietam, Chickamauga, and Atlanta. Nisbet is remarkably difficult to find in the original edition, and there is much important material that is not reproduced in Bell Wiley's 1963 edition. 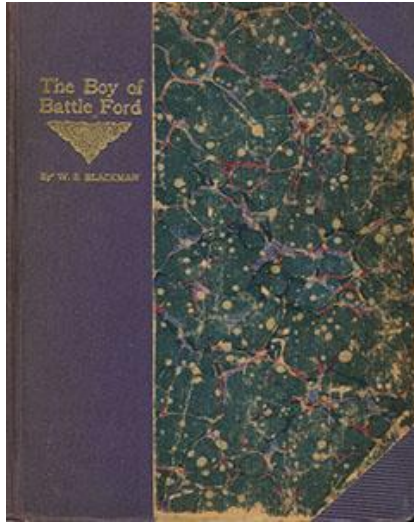

Drawing on a trove of primary sources, Walker follows the soldiers of the 57<sup>th</sup> Georgia Infantry, as they pushed into Kentucky, starved at Vicksburg, guarded prisoners at Andersonville, defended Atlanta from Sherman, served as the rear guard in Hood's retreat from Tennessee, and joined in the last desperate charge of the Army of Tennessee at Bentonville. (120<sup>th</sup> Illinois) **Blackman, W. S. THE BOY OF BATTLE FORD AND THE MAN. Marion, IL: 1906. 1<sup>st</sup> edition, 192p., illustrations (ports.), faux ¾ leather using cloth, marbled boards, [D339].** This remarkable memoir chronicles the life of a southern Illinois minister who served during the Civil War in the 120<sup>th</sup> Illinois regiment. As such Blackman writes revealing material about garrison life in Memphis, including much of sin as well as salvation. In June of 1864 the 120<sup>th</sup> Illinois participated in the expedition against General Forrest that ended in the disastrous defeat at Brice's Crossroads. Blackman's detailed account is a crucial primary source in understanding that campaign. Printed on pulp paper with usual toning, but with no loss of text; gilt spine lettering rubbed off; light sun; light fox; light wear at extremities; else very good. \$325.00

(47<sup>th</sup> Illinois) **Burdette, Robert J. DRUMS OF THE 47<sup>th</sup>. Indianapolis: (1914). Paperback reprint, 211p., [D201A].** Nevins and Robertson fault Burdette for sermonizing, and for being too philosophical. We cannot agree that this is a bad thing. DRUMS OF THE 47<sup>th</sup> is one of the most remarkable of memoirs because the author eschews the typical narrative chronicle of marches and battles and instead wrestles with heady issues like courage and cowardice, soldiers' fieldcraft (not taught in the manuals), the leadership traits of effective colonels, and the destructive *nature* of war. Throughout the author provides compelling stories of western battles such as Corinth. Very good. \$15.95

(39<sup>th</sup> Illinois) **Clark, Charles M. THE HISTORY OF THE THIRTY-NINTH REGIMENT ILLINOIS VOLUNTEER VETERAN INFANTRY (YATES' PHALANX) IN THE WAR OF THE REBELLION, 1861-1865... Chicago: 1889. 1<sup>st</sup> edition, 554(3)p., illustrations, maps. [D-185]** A good study, scarce in first edition. Named for the governor of Illinois, the 39th was one of a few Prairie State regiments to serve in the east and the only one in the Carolinas; they fought at Battery Wagner, Drury's Bluff, North of the James, Ft. Gregg and Appomattox. Includes roster and many personal accounts. Hinges shaken; light chipping of extremities; water stains on front fly and frontispiece; light water stains in text; light soil and very light foxing; else very good. \$425.00

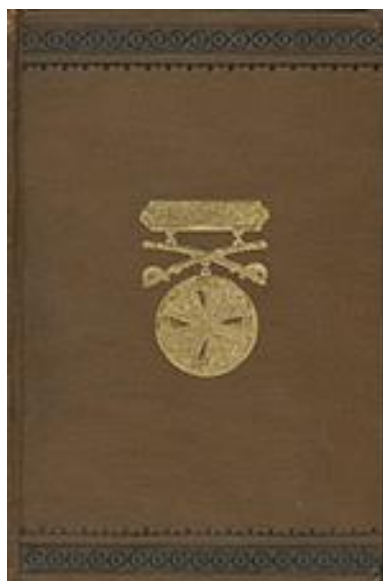

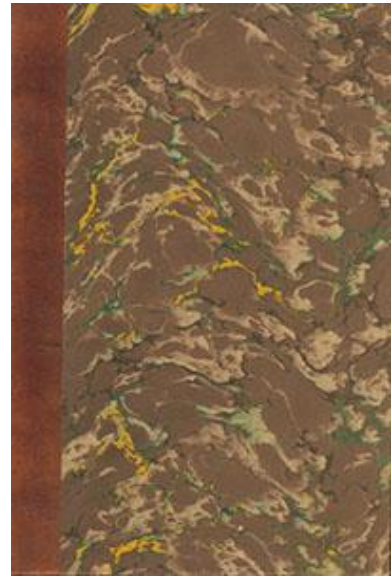

Freeport, IL: 1866. 1<sup>st</sup> edition, 76p., roster, [D199].** This slim volume is one of the scarcest of Illinois regimentals, and valuable to historians for the inclusion of reports and correspondence not found elsewhere. The 46<sup>th</sup> regiment came from west-central Illinois and fought at Shiloh, Davis' Bridge and Vicksburg, among other places. Cracked hinges; foxing; sunned at the spine; lightly rubbed; inscribed by a veteran, "Miss Jennie A Hough, From Harry, 46<sup>th</sup> Ill."; else very good. Major operations, such as campaigns against Forrest at Guntown and Tupelo, are also most helpful. Includes detailed rosters, and thumbnail biographies of the officers. An important Illinois regimental. Beautifully rebound in ½ leather with faux raised spines and gilt lettering; marbled boards and end pages; newspaper clipping tipped-in regarding veteran Henry Strong suggests book originally belonged to him; Very nice. \$425.00

Smith, adjutant of the regiment. His signature "Smith" appears on a flyleaf, and an apparent ancestor's

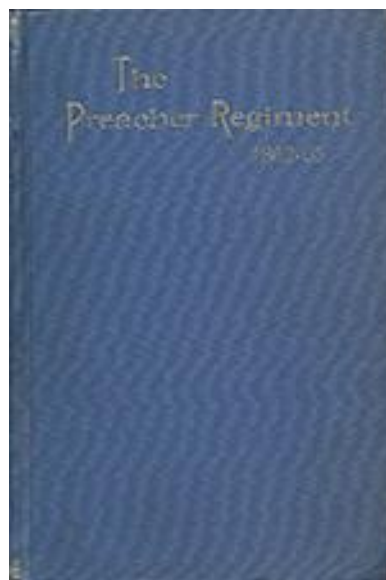
